Lawrence Richardson, of Adwolfe, at right above, shown excavating at the Fox site in Smyth County in 1974, was a Smyth County dairy farmer and avocational archeologist. He figured out well before anyone else that the Yuchi Indians were in Holstonia.

#### My Winchester Abstract

Abstract: Virginia's Smyth and Washington Counties have yielded vast quantities of Mississippian Period Indian goods — mostly from flood plains and caves. Almost all of this material went into the private holdings of Indian relic collectors. This presentation shows images of much of that material drawn from the author's personal photographs taken during visits to private collections, from the relic collectors' literature, and from contemporary newspaper accounts. In aggregate, the evidence is overwhelming.

#### Mississippian Culture and Relic Collecting

Mississippian is a poorly defined term that describes the American Indian societies that occupied the Mississippi River watershed and the Deep South during the period 800-1600 AD. The people of these societies were generally mound builders, relied on maize-based sustenance, had social ranks, engaged in ceremonial activities, produced highly artistic objects with iconic designs from marine shell, copper, pottery, etc., and engaged in long distance trade and exchange.

**Indian Relic collecting** is the practice of privately accumulating American Indian objects. Points (arrowheads are the most commonly collected objects, Many of the highly artistic relics (such as those shown here) were dug from Indian burials.






- The principal purpose of prehistoric archeology in SW Virginia must surely be to tell the story of the region's pre-Columbian inhabitants




# Three Tributary Forks of the Holston River Straddle Washington and Smyth Counties

# Virginia Counties with Mississippian Goods




Red = Much evidence for Mississippian grave goods Pink = Some evidence for Mississippian grave goods








#### In the Beginning, Archeology was Indiana Jones

On November 26, 1922, Howard Carter and Lord Carnarvon entered King Tut's tomb, and found an immense treasure. On February 16, 1923, Carter opened the innermost chamber and found the sarcophagus of King Tut.

The Archeological Society of Virginia was founded in Richmond on January 8, 1940, as the Virginia Indian Relic Collector's Club. when 17 Virginians met at the Valentine Museum

#### C. G. Holland on the Grave Robbers

"About 40 years ago one of a family of several brothers began to dig at night in open sites and to enter caves for artifacts. Through the following years this man [Robey Maiden] with single-minded determination dug in nearly all the open, pottery-bearing sites and caves within a large radius of Saltville. The artifacts sought were mainly pipes, ear ornaments, shell pendants and similar objects that were highly prized and sold well. Others of the family took up this activity and the pattern spread to embrace many people in their town and surrounding community. It is estimated that 40 to 50 people are now engaged in this destructive digging between Tazewell and Washington Counties." (Preface, 1970)



#### The Salt-Powered Chiefdom

The "salt-powered chiefdom" centered at Saltville was given that name by Barber and Barfield in 1996

They also said in that 1996 paper that the prehistory of Saltville is: "[O]ne of the most fascinating developments within Native American cultures within the Commonwealth."

#### The Salt Powered Chiefdom

"Areas of Smyth and Washington counties, Virginia have long been known for the recovery of abundant exotic goods dating to the Late Woodland period. These include Citico conch shell gorgets copper disks and beads, and small funerary pots. The presence of these Mississippian origin artifact in an isolated area of Virginia has cause some consternation in Virginia archaeology. The authors suggest that this displacement of trade goods is a direct function of the exploitation of the salt deposits at Saltville Due to the high salt content of the brine copious amounts of the surface deposit could be easily processed. It is hypothesized that an indigenous Late Woodland population provided trade salt to the Southeast in exchange for exotic goods. Concomitant with this exchange system was the evolution of the local population from tribal to chiefdom level to control the trade."

# Salt Trading Enriched SW Virginia Indians

"Areas of Smyth and Washington counties, Virginia, have long been known for the recovery of abundant exotic goods dating to the Late Woodland period. These include Citico conch shell gorgets, copper disks and beads, and small funerary pots. The presence of these Mississippian origin artifacts in an isolated area of Virginia has caused some consternation in Virginia archaeology."\*

Barber and Barfield proposed that salt was traded out for high quality incoming goods.

#### Role of Caves in Holstonia

In Holstonia caves substituted for mounds as Indian ceremonial and religious sites

The below cited 1997 report tells that of 37 known Indian burial caves in Virginia (34 of which are in Smyth and Washington Counties) "...only three remain relatively undisturbed by looters."

#### **Cautionary Note**

- Reproduction or fake pipes are common
- Reproduction or fake gorgets are less common and somewhat easier to spot
- With a couple of noted exceptions, I believe this presentation to be free of reproductions and fakes
































#### Gorgets from the Dr. C. C. Hatfield Collection







- Any chance of us getting a proper archeology of Holstonia has long gone. But for the sake of the Yuchi (and for Virginia history) the story must be reconstructed to the extent that it can be.
